Rending Goodnight Mister Tom' - Michelle Magorian

English

Goodnight Mister Tom can be used to explore character development and emotions by analysing the relationship between Willie and Mister Tom, encouraging students to identify key themes such as friendship, trust, and resilience. Additionally, students can write diary entries from Willie's perspective, practicing descriptive writing and reflecting on the historical context of World War II.

Music

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Geography

History

The book highlights the emotional struggles and difficulties caused by the war, such as families being separated, the loss of loved ones, and the pressures it placed on everyone. Through the relationship between Mr Tom and Willie, we see how ordinary people coped with the challenges and changes brought about by the war.

Willie's experience as an evacuee is central to the story. It demonstrates the various challenges evacuees had to face, including fear, homesickness, adjusting to new surroundings, and sometimes escaping difficult situations.

Science

The book can be used to teach science by exploring the impact of World War II on health, such as the effects of rationing on nutrition and the importance of exercise and fresh air for wellbeing. Students can examine the science of weather, considering how storms and the changing seasons are described in the book, and how these conditions affect the characters' lives and experiences..
